Duane's Retraction Syndrome

Duane's syndrome is when one (or sometimes both) eyes don't turn to the side very well and the eyelids open and close as the eyes try to turn. Usually, it's difficult for the eye to look towards the side, away from the nose. Sometimes, it also cannot look towards the nose.

What causes it?

There are six muscles on the outside of each eyeball which move the eyes around. To move the eyes, the brain sends messages through nerves to the muscles. In people with Duane's syndrome, the nerves get connected wrongly so the messages from the brain go to the wrong muscles.

How the world looks to you

Most people with Duane's syndrome can see very well.

How you look to the world

When you look straight ahead, usually no one can tell you have Duane's syndrome. People may notice that your eyes don't move around properly, or that your eyes don't point straight some of the time, and you may look as if you're winking when you're not.

How can the doctor tell?

The orthoptist and the doctor will be able to tell you have Duane's syndrome simply by watching how your eyes move around.

Getting it sorted

You will need to come to the eye clinic from time to time to check you have good vision. Sometimes, we give you glasses or, in young children, an eyepatch for a few hours a day, to help you see well. Usually no other treatment is needed.

If the Duane's syndrome causes a lot of problems, like having to turn your head a lot, or if you have a noticeable squint even looking straight ahead, doctors can do an operation to make this better, but they cannot make your eye movements normal, even with an operation.
